About ICCN

The International Center on Conflict and Negotiation (ICCN). is an independent, peace-making, research and training institution that was founded in 1994 thanks to financial support from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. and organizational support from the Center for International Security and Arms Control at Stanford University. ICCN was established with the aim of building peace and accord in a divided post-totalitarian society, putting its main effort on conflict prevention and resolution in the Caucasus region with special focus on Georgia. In the following years it became clear that reaching these objectives would be possible only by empowering civil society, advocating human rights, tightly cooperating with other important actors. All these have since become ICCN programmatic goals. In recent years ICCN has diversified its activities and partnership to assist social groups like internally displaced people (IDPs), returnees, ethnic minorities, religious minorities, young journalists and women's NGOs. Georgia is in the process of democratic transformation. Civil society organizations are vital for development and positive changes. ICCN has unique experience

ICCN's recent successful stories/projects:

ICCN, with UNFPA support, created a community of educators to combat gender-based violence in Georgia.

ICCN, within the framework of EED (German Protestant Development Service) support, educated and empowered IDP communities in Tbillisi and Shida Kartlii. Trainings for IDP communities, IDP young leaders and women mobilized them and created multiplier effects in the whole region.

ICCN, in cooperation with Mercy Corps, contributes to the strengthening, empowering and integration of local communities and local self-government.

ICCN, in partnership with Berghof Peace Support, IKV Pax Christi, Agency for Ecomonic, Social and cultural development (Tskhizivalli), World Without Violence (Sukhumi) and with the support of the EU, is implementing the program: Engagement through Dialogue. Dialogue and study viall series are conducted for the transformation of the Georgian-Abkhaz and Georgian-Ossetian conflicts.

ICCN, within the framework of the Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflict, is involved in global networking for peace promotion. It leads a Georgian-Russian dialogue of political experts and also facilitates meetings between Armenian and Azerbaijani representatives.

ICCN is a one of the pioneer in protection of religious minority rights in Georgia.

ICCN was nominated and awarded as a distinguished supporter of tolerance by the Tolerance Center at the Public Defender's Office of Georgia.
